Gravelly Hill Interchange, Junction 6:

Landmark structure, "spaghetti junction"

Due to the intersecting traffic lanes.

There's nearly 600 concrete columns, 80 feet high over 30 acres; 18 routes split on 5 different levels With 200,000 vehicles per day Including 26,000 lorries.

Described by the Guinness Book of Records "Most complex in the British roads system", Off the grid on towers of concrete columns.
